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
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Our mission is to advance collectively the interests of West Virginia's independent colleges and universities and their students.

Message from the Chairman

We are seeing the opportunities we have in tourism and technology related fields. We are seeing growing demand for quality, accessible, and affordable health care. And we are seeing a renewed focus on how our citizens learn and obtain their education.

West Virginia's elected officials and thought leaders are navigating the challenges and opportunities we currently face. As we witness the beginning stages of change one thing is clear, West Virginia needs more thinkers, creators, skilled leaders, and home-grown entrepreneurs to build a strong future. To that end, West Virginia Independent Colleges & Universities (WVICU) and our member institutions will be there to offer our perspectives and solutions for a brighter future in West Virginia.

This past year we have made a concerted effort to be more visible, more vocal, and more driven to increase our accomplishments and contributions to this great state. We fervently believe our colleges and universities not only drive positive results, but do so more effectively, in many instances, than our friends in the public sector. Consider the following:

- We SERVE: On average, roughly 40% of our eight institutions' students are low income. The state's public institutions' averages are the same. Our institutions are in nearly every geographic area of the state and have an over \$600 million annual economic impact.
- We BELONG: The state's policies for the past several years have been aimed to help public institutions, but policy makers are beginning to realize the significant contributions private universities make. We will be a bigger part of that conversation moving forward.
- We ACHIEVE: Our institutions have a 16% higher four-year graduation rate and a 10% higher six-year graduation rate than public institutions. Upon graduation private university students graduate ten months sooner and earn roughly \$4,000 per year more than public university students.

On behalf of the eight member-institutions and our board of directors thank you for supporting WVICU. Please continue to partner with us as we increase our voice and our impact while remaining focused on quality results – results that help put West Virginia on a better path forward.

Circle of Vision

SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The Circle of Vision Scholarship Program was started in 1997 and provides West Virginia students with the opportunity to attend one of our eight private colleges or universities. Many of these scholars are the first in their family to attend college.

The average four-year graduation rate at WVICU institutions is 16% higher than WV's public institutions; and the six-year graduation rate is 10% higher.

WVICU colleges and universities do not receive state government funding. WVICU institutions depend on corporations, foundations, and private partnerships to help make college more affordable for West Virginia students. Since 1997, Circle of Vision scholarships have been awarded to 3,304 students totaling \$5,993,875.

During the 2018-2019 academic year, the Circle of Vision Scholarship Program assisted sixty (60) students who demonstrated financial need and academic excellence with the total giving of more than \$350,000 distributed among all eight member institutions.


Legacy Endowment

SCHOLARSHIP FUND

WVICU established the Legacy Endowment Scholarship Fund in 2010. By contributing to this fund, you can make a permanent and positive difference in the lives of deserving West Virginia college students through planned or current giving.

Bequests from generous West Virginians helped establish this fund, which awards scholarships annually to West Virginia students at member colleges and universities through the Circle of Vision Scholarship Program.

Several large donations from individuals who believe in private higher education were combined to create this fund. Many others have contributed to the fund over time. The Legacy Fund has contributed a total of \$120,000 to the Circle of Vision Scholarship Program over the last six academic years.



The Legacy Fund's goal is to provide more than two Circle of Vision Scholarships each year through additional contributions and investments.

Hon. John F. McKuskey is the co-founder of Shuman, McCuskey & Slicer PLLC. He was appointed as a Justice on the Supreme Court of Appeals of West Virginia in 1998 and has been practicing law for over 40 years.

This year marks the 50th year since my graduation from West Virginia Wesleyan College.

Looking back from that retrospective on my half-century career in law and politics in West Virginia that followed my graduation, I can say that no decision over that span of time has been more important to my work-life success and happiness than choosing to attend Wesleyan.


2018 Gifts & Funding Sources


